2015 School Climate Star Ratings released

School climate refers to the quality and character of school life -- the “culture” of a school. This month, we released the 2015 School Climate Star Ratings, based on survey results and data from the 2014-15 school year. Each school in Georgia received a 1-5 star rating, with five stars representing an excellent school climate and one star representing a school climate most in need of improvement. The ratings are an informational tool for schools, administrators and parents; they do not affect the school’s College & Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) score. SBOE approves social studies standards

At its June meeting, the State Board of Education approved the first Georgia Standards of Excellence (GSE) for social studies. The standards, which were developed based on public feedback from teachers, parents and families, students, post-secondary institutions, business and industry representatives, and community members, will be implemented during the 2017-18 school year after a year of teacher training. Initiative: Increase the graduation rate for students with disabilities

Pillar: Guaranteed & Viable Standards

The Georgia Department of Education is implementing **Student Success: Imagine the Possibilities** to improve graduation for all students -- including students with disabilities. The GaDOE aligned with regional technical assistance providers to support district leadership, and 50 districts are receiving intensive technical assistance. District teams use a problem-solving framework to develop or revise a district-wide plan for school-level implementation. National Dropout Prevention Center resources support selection of evidence-based practices. Georgia aims to increase the annual graduation rate for students with disabilities from 39.4% (FY 2014) to 65% (FY 2019). For more information, visit bit.ly/georgiaSSIP.
